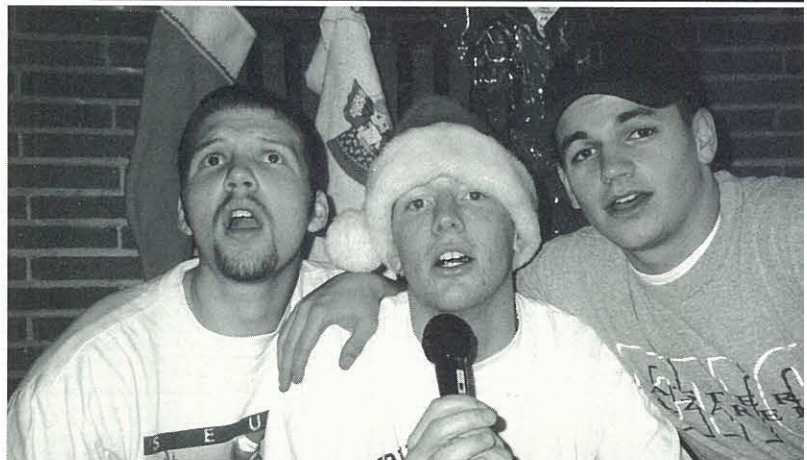

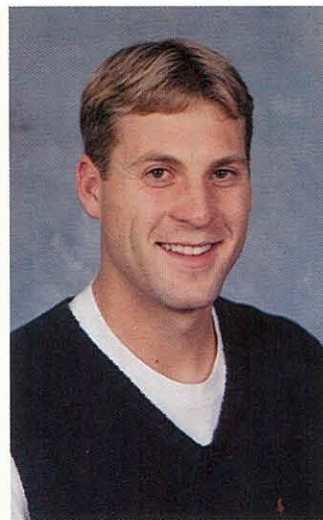
Senioritis is basically the art of procrastination! I have had this problem for a while. I don't deal with it until it is almost too late, but then I do my homework and the problem is solved.

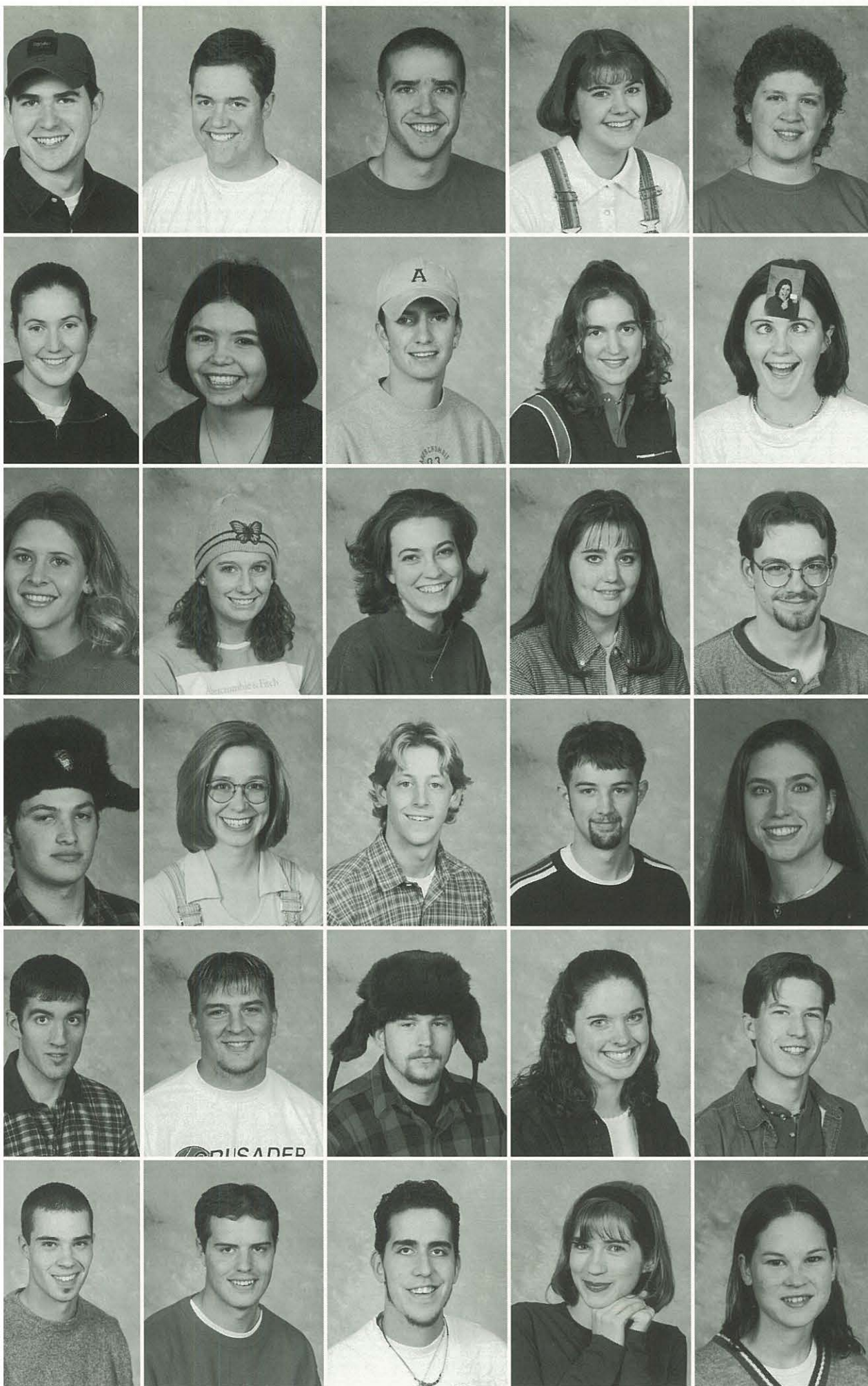
I think that, freshmen year, social life took priority. But now that the realization of working toward and accomplishing my goals has hit home, the academic life is taking precedence.

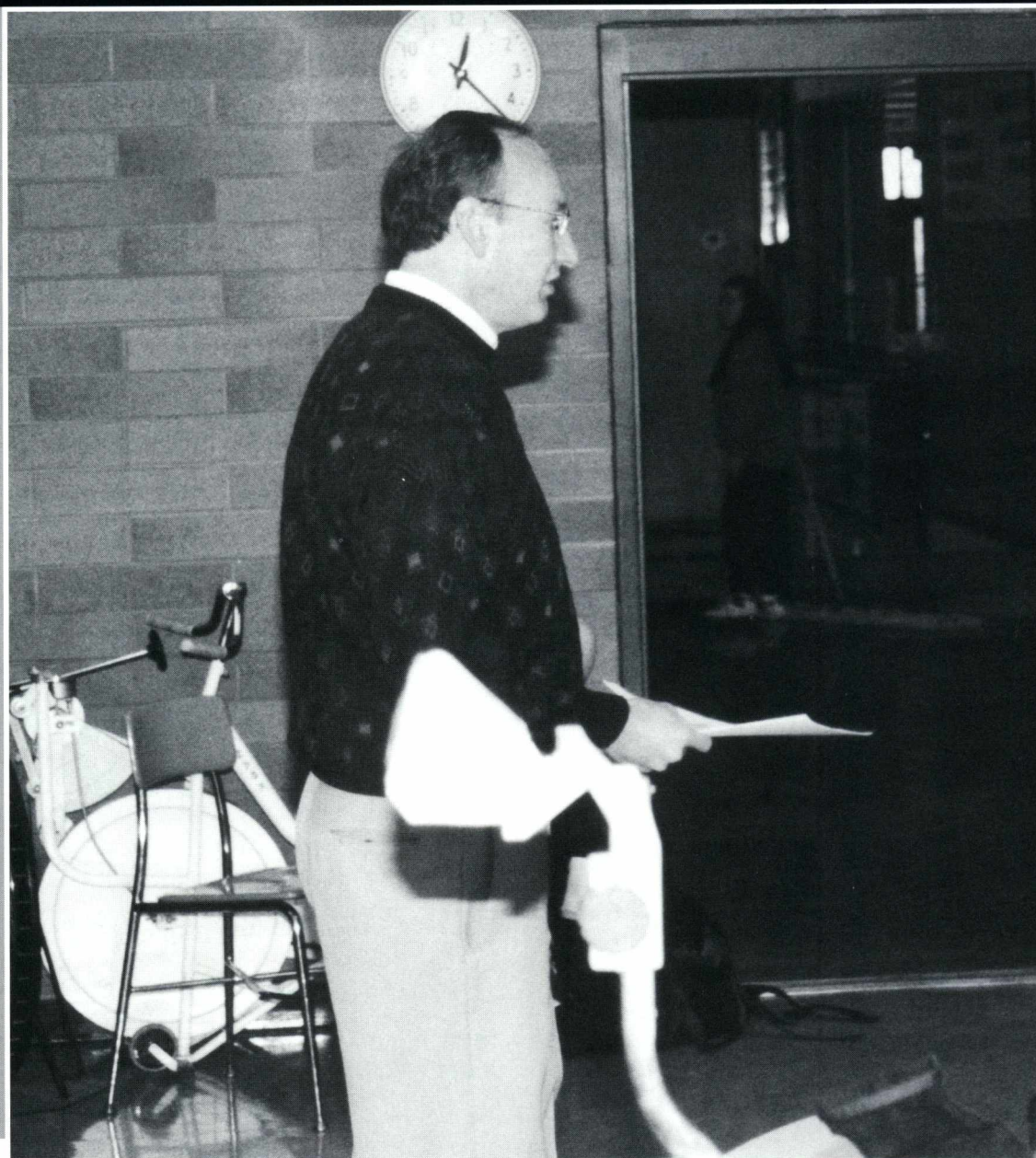
Dr. Diane Leclerc

Dr. Lynn Neil

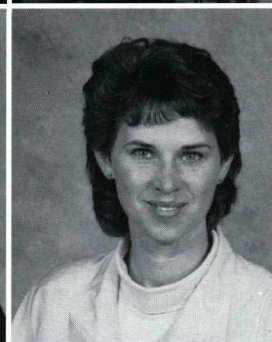
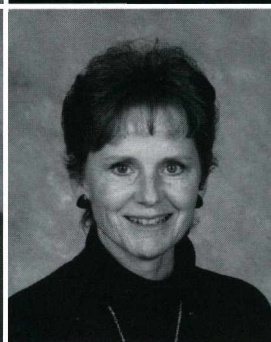
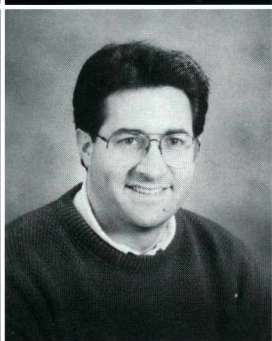
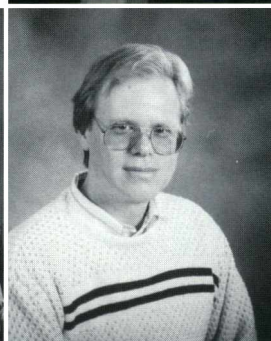
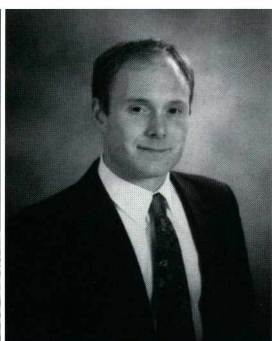

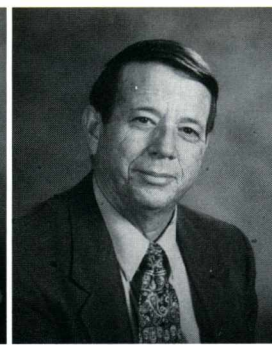
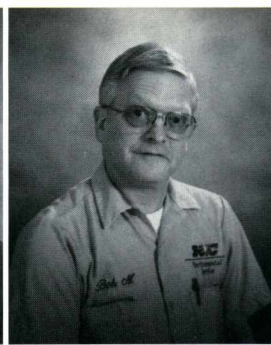
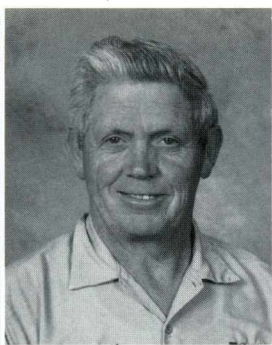
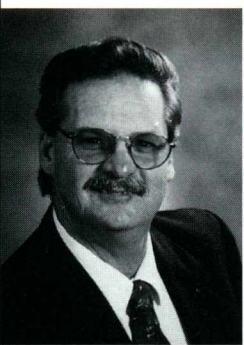
Dr. Michelle Marshman

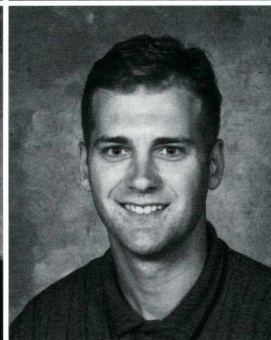
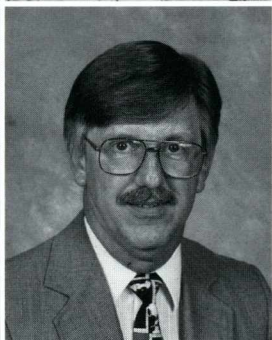

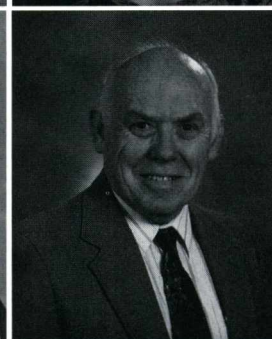

Dr. Glenna Andrews

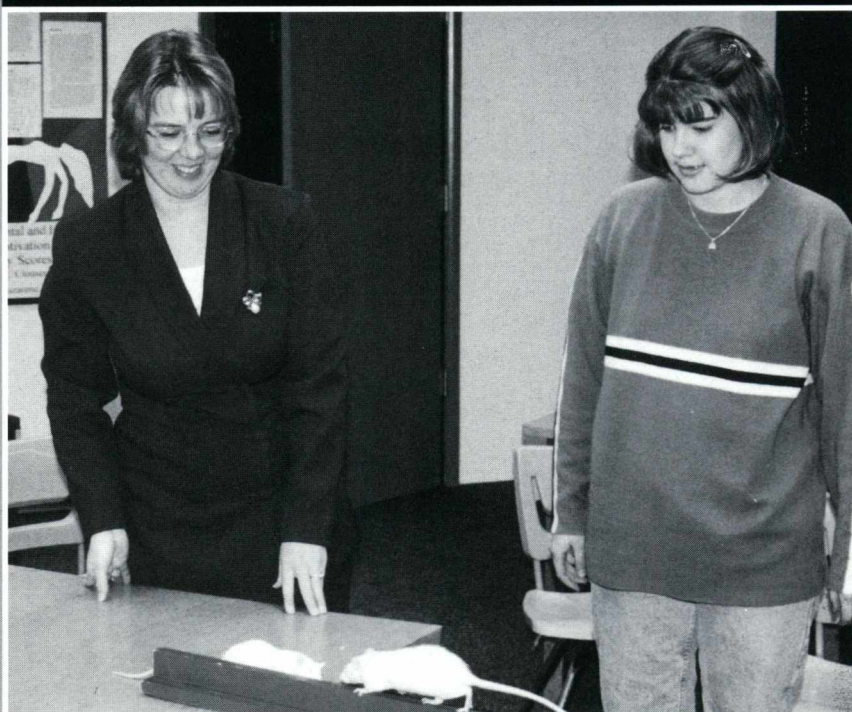

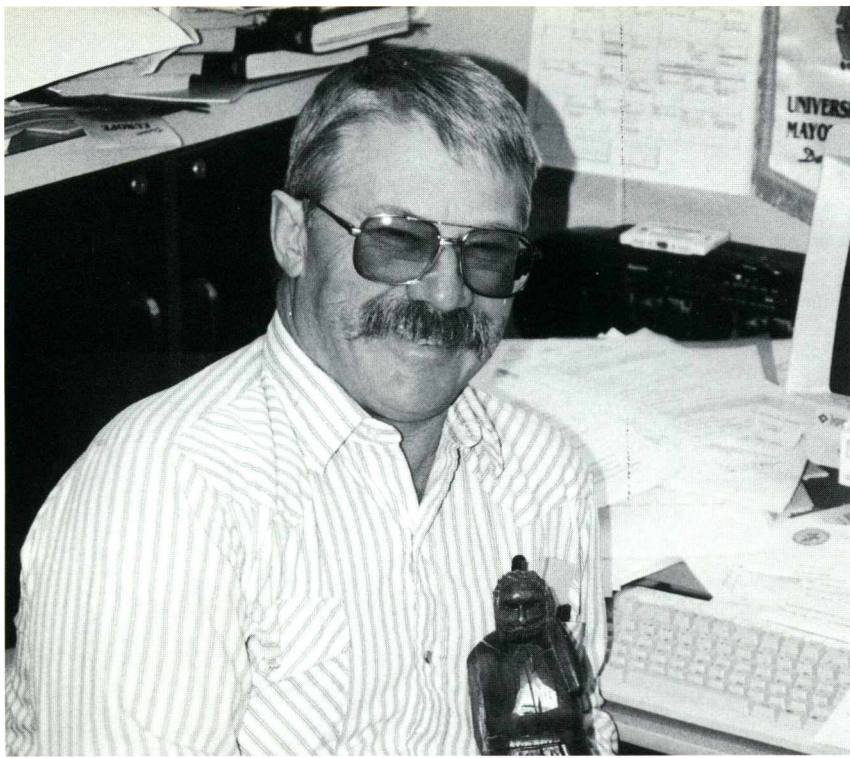
Brooke Ferdinand

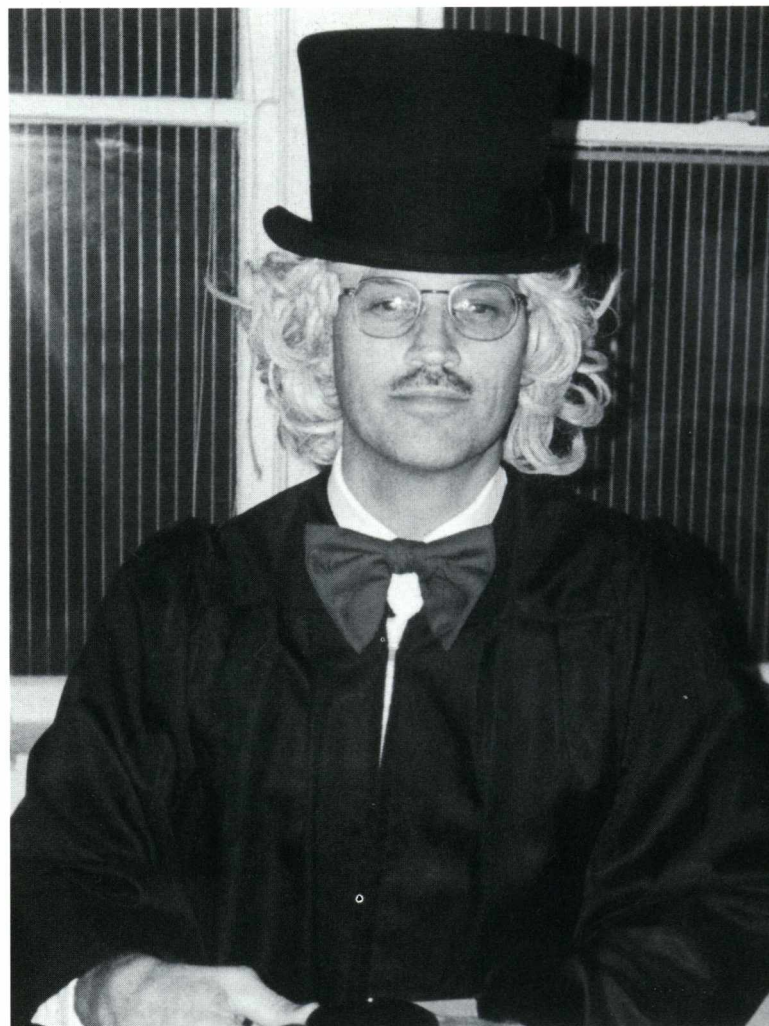
FOCUS ON FACULTY *Dr. Newell Morgan*

Prof. Ed Crawford

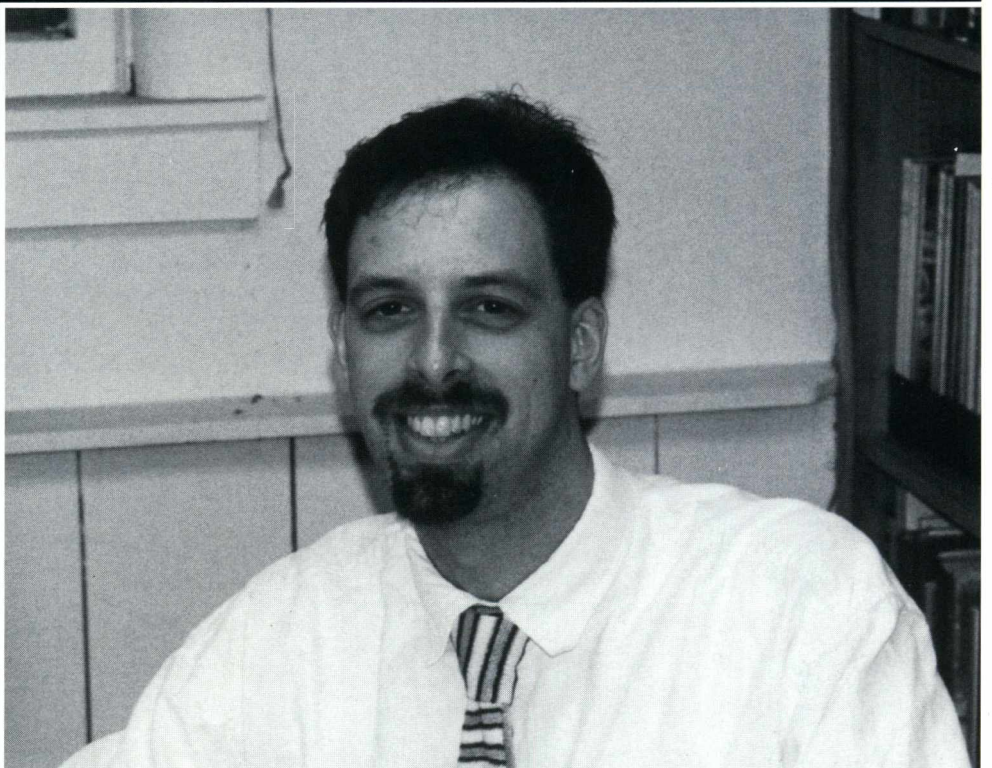

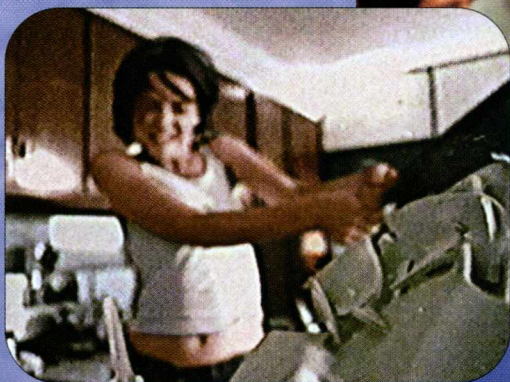

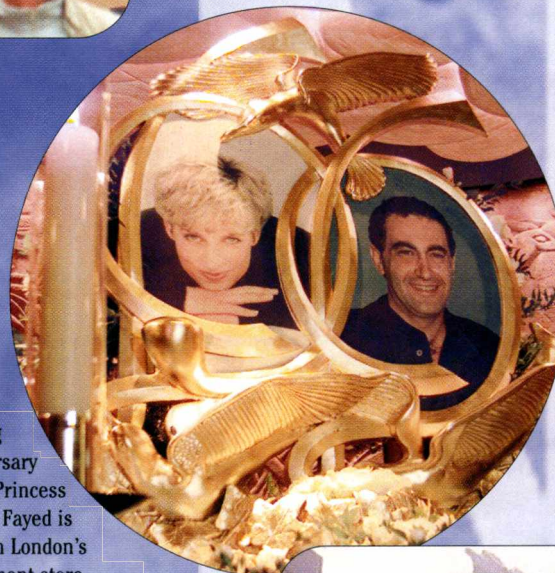

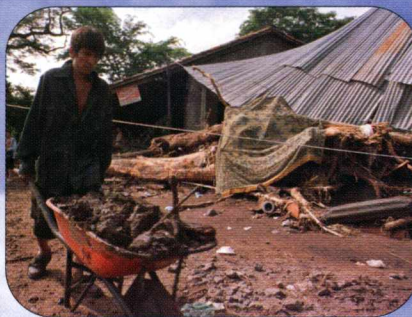

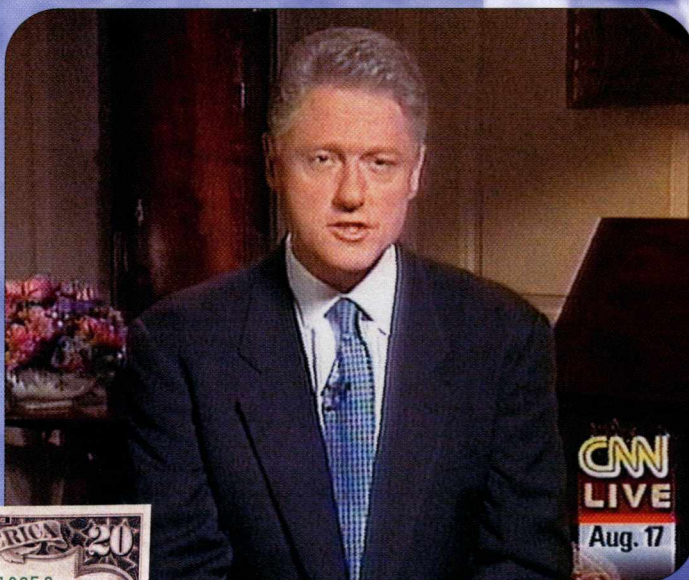

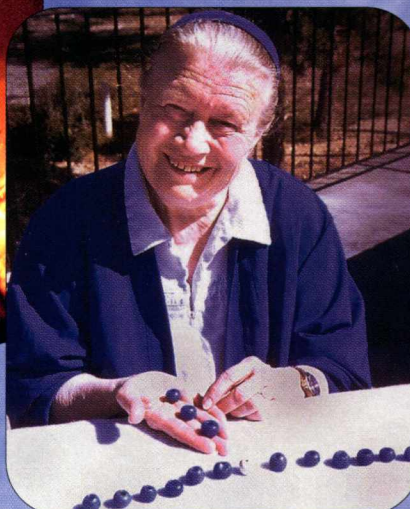

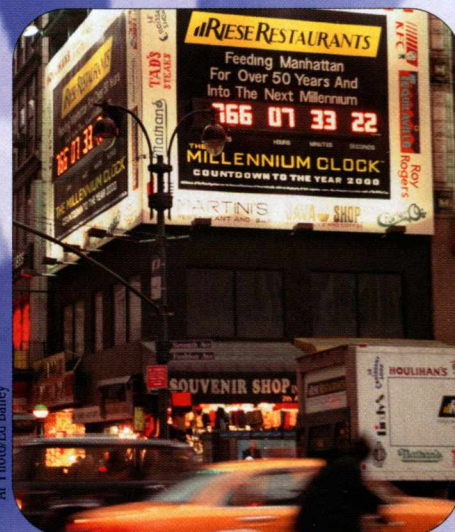

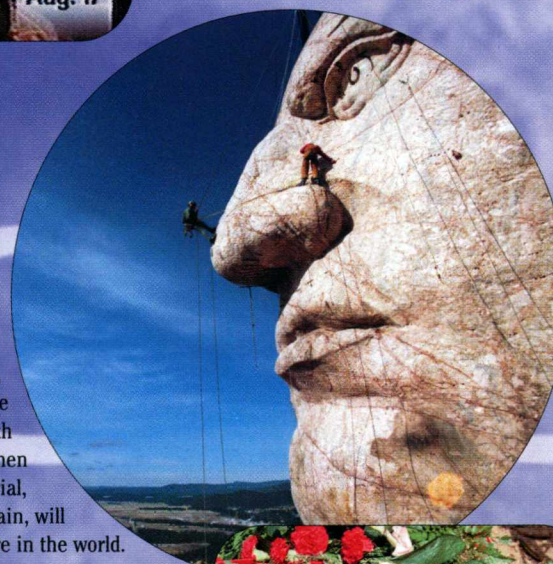

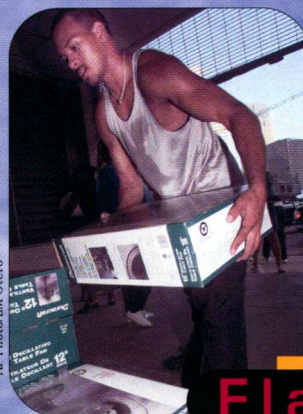

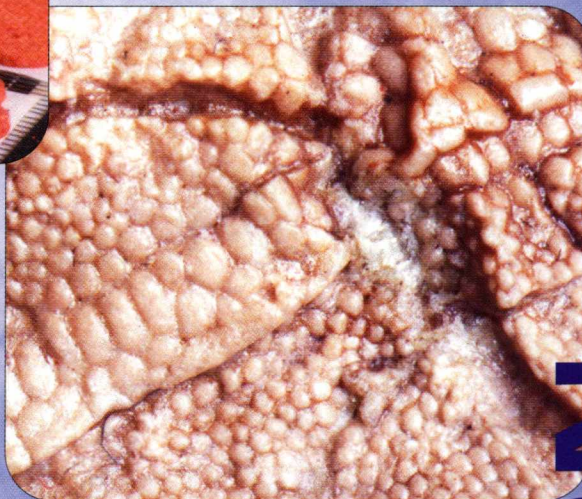

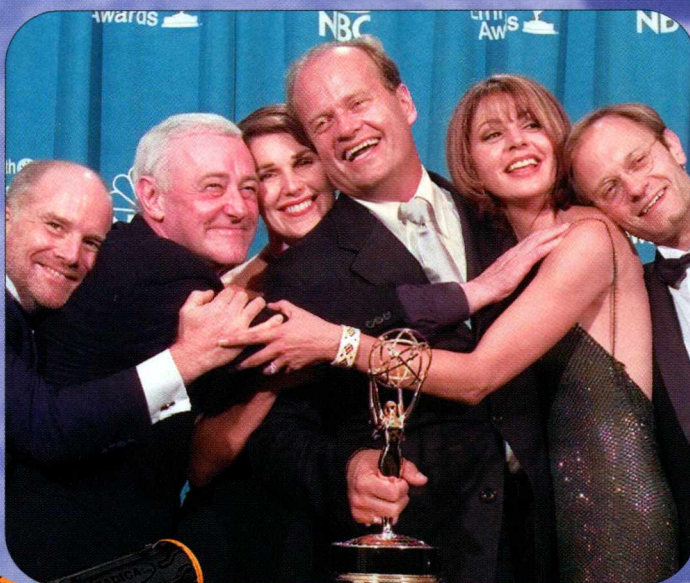

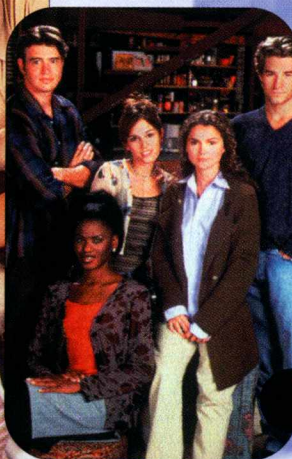

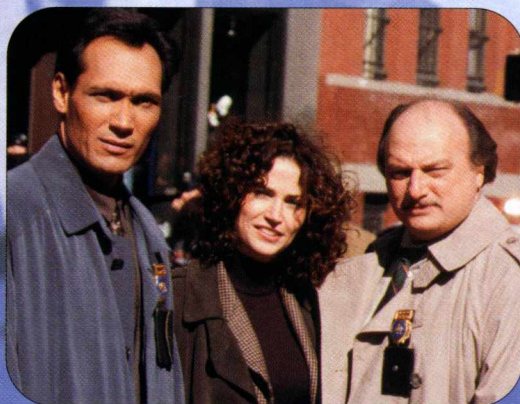

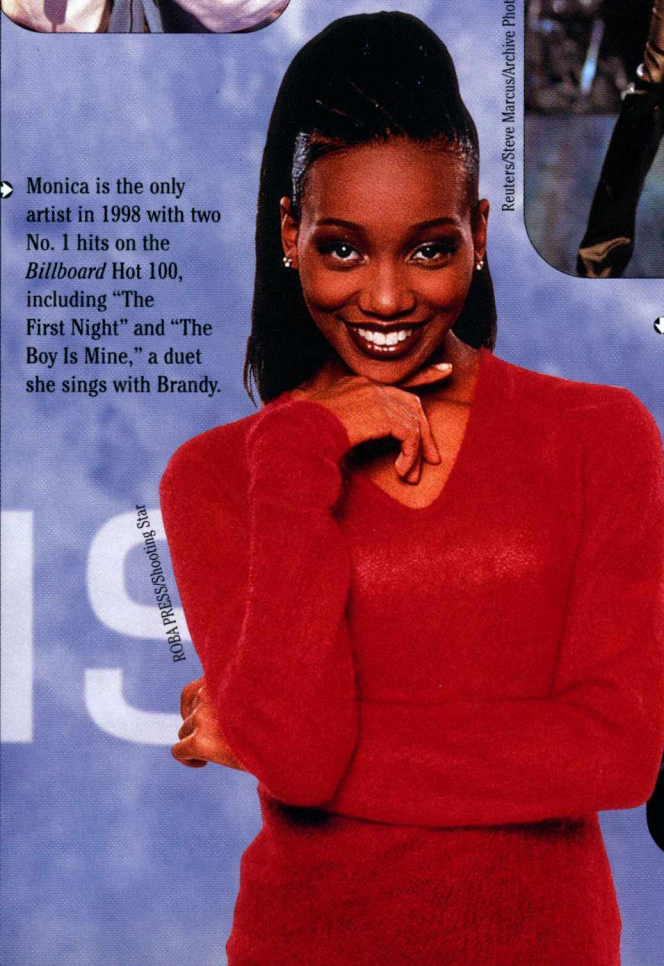

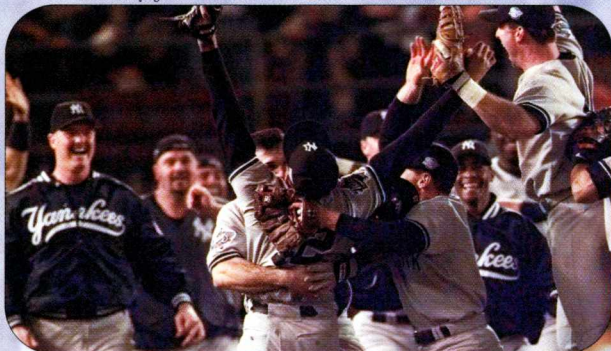

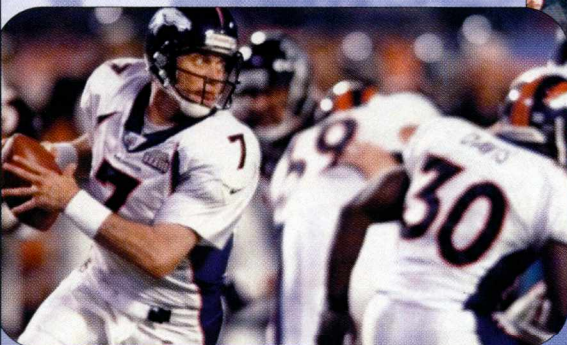

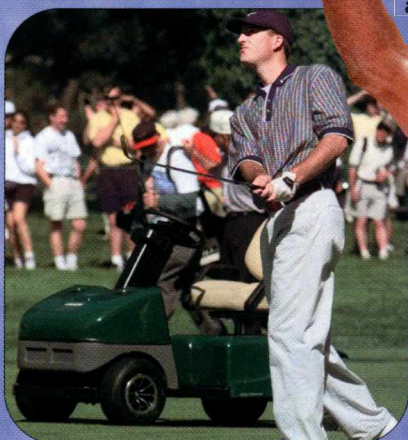

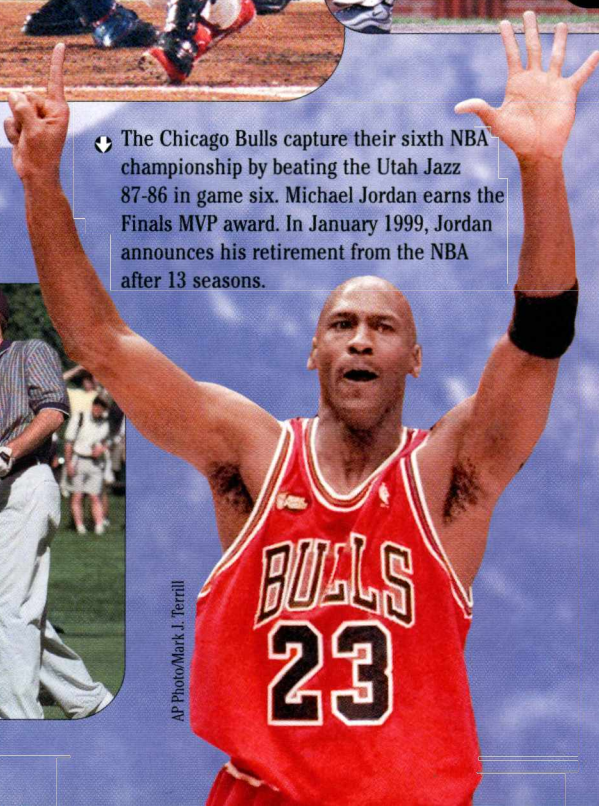

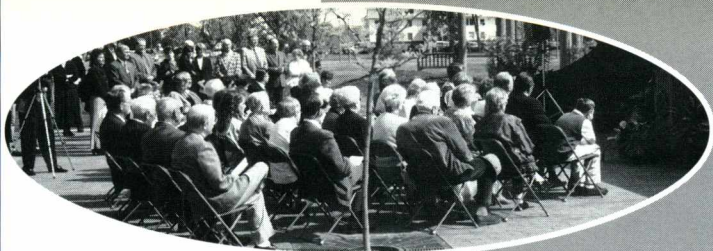

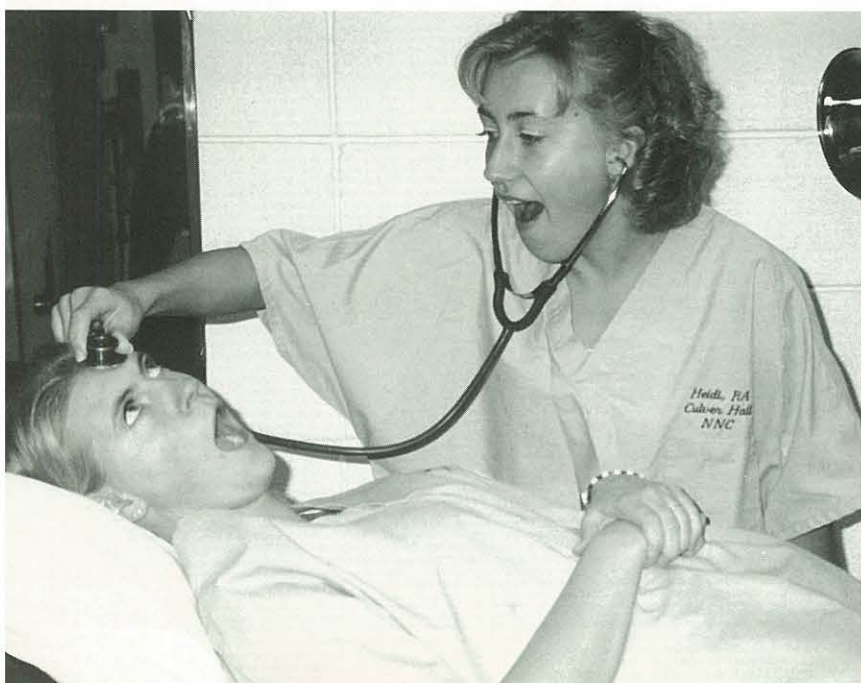

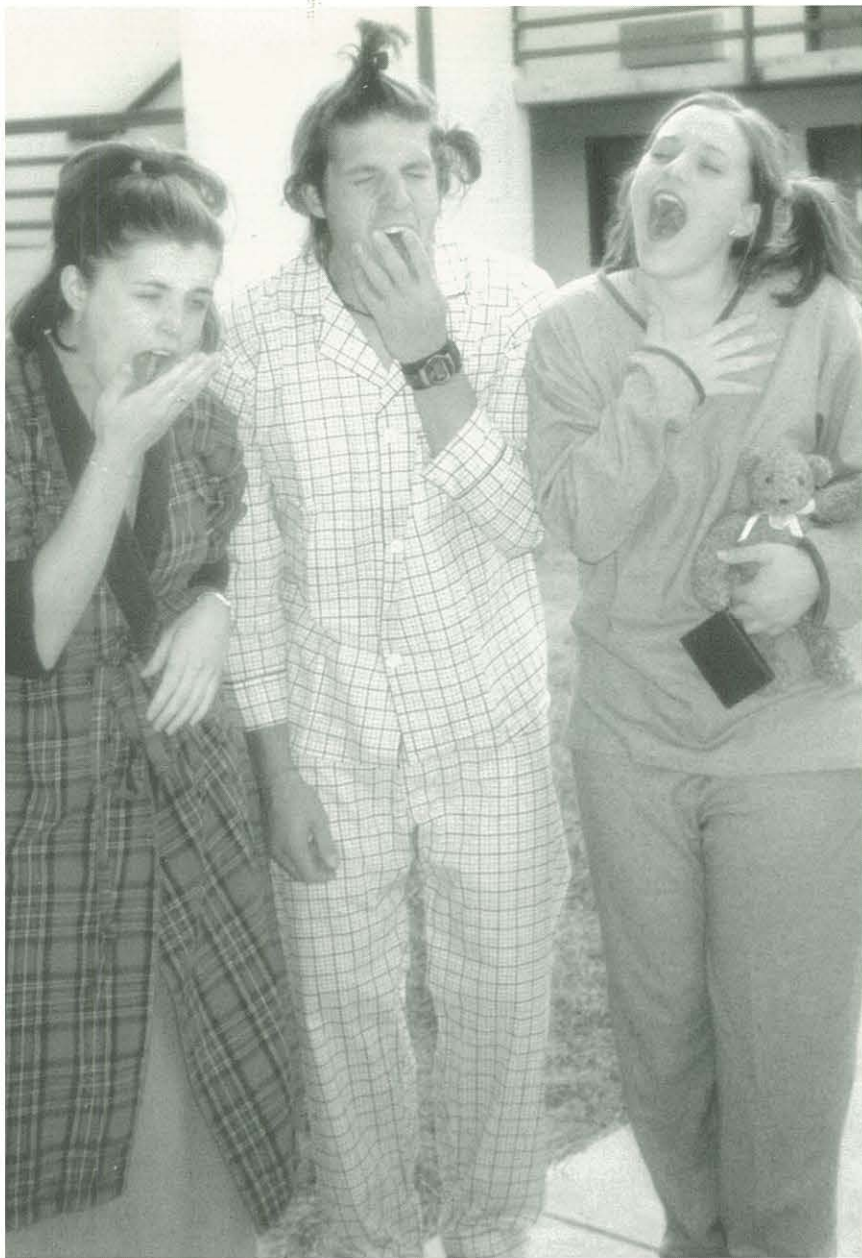

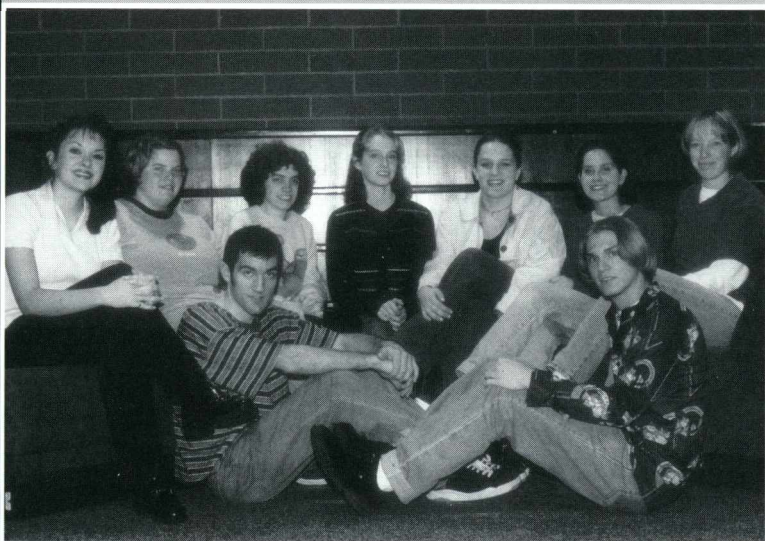

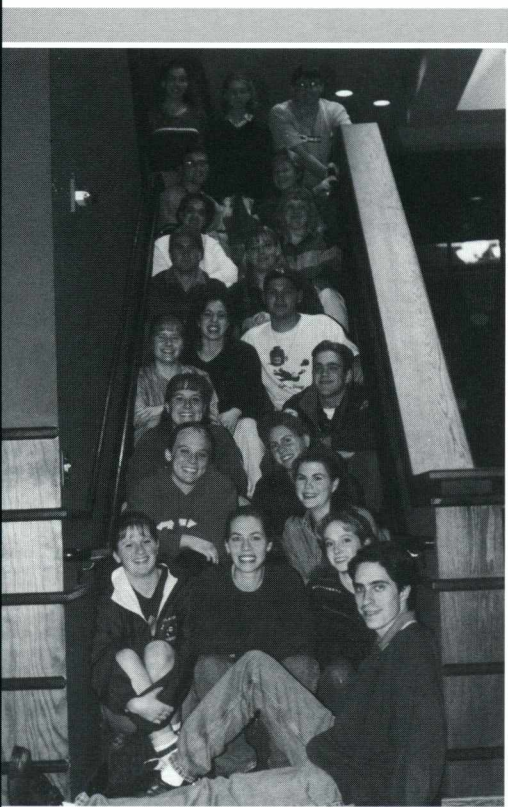

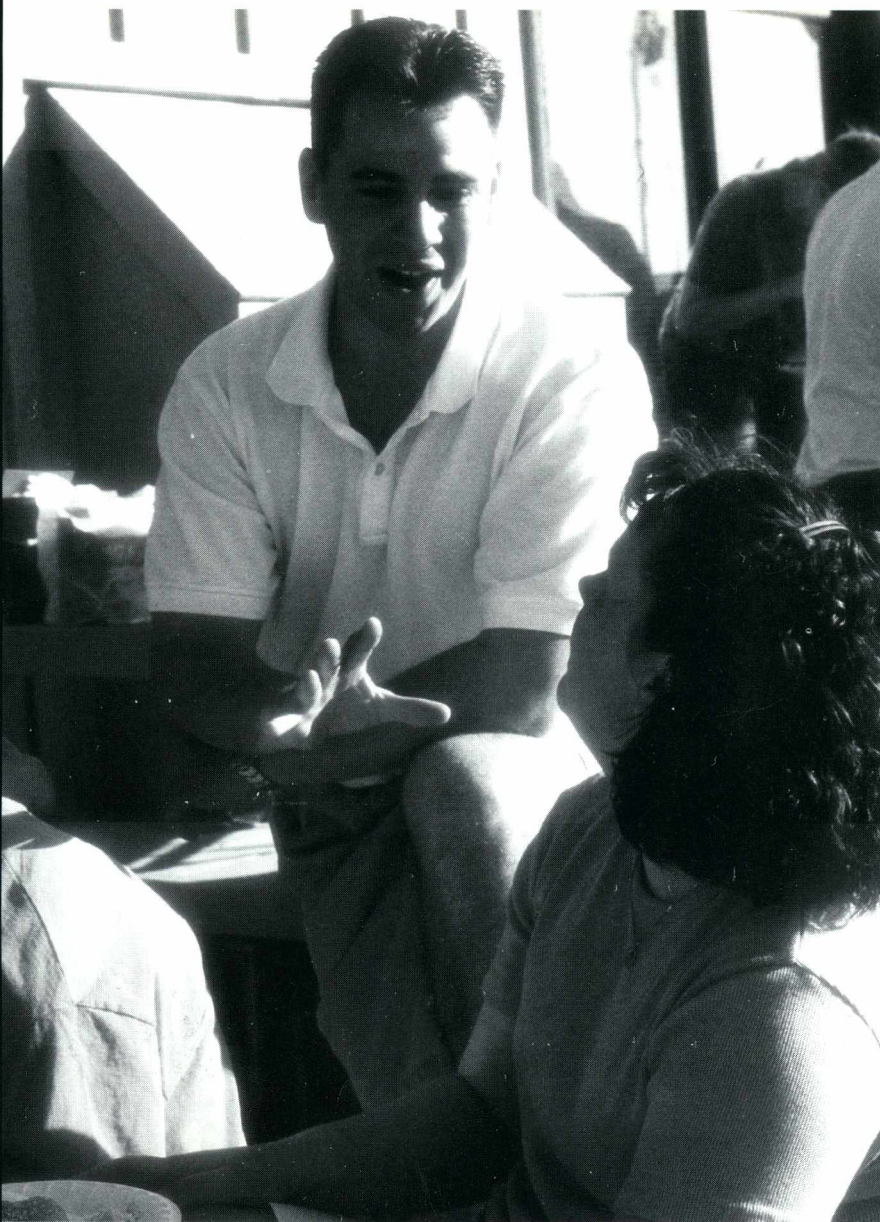

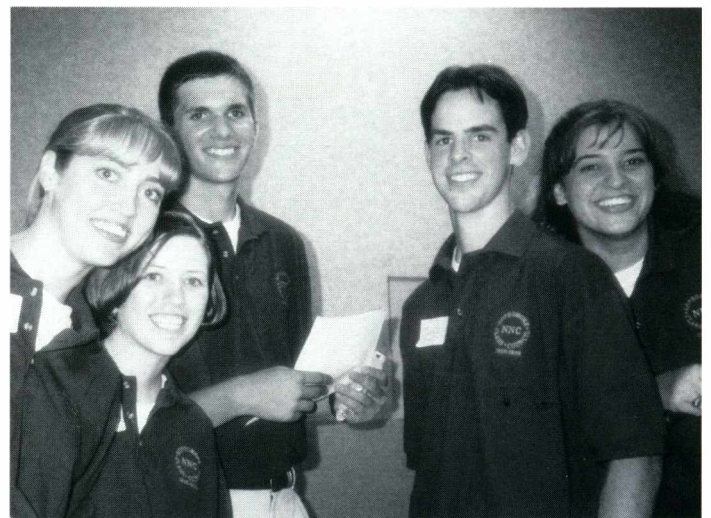

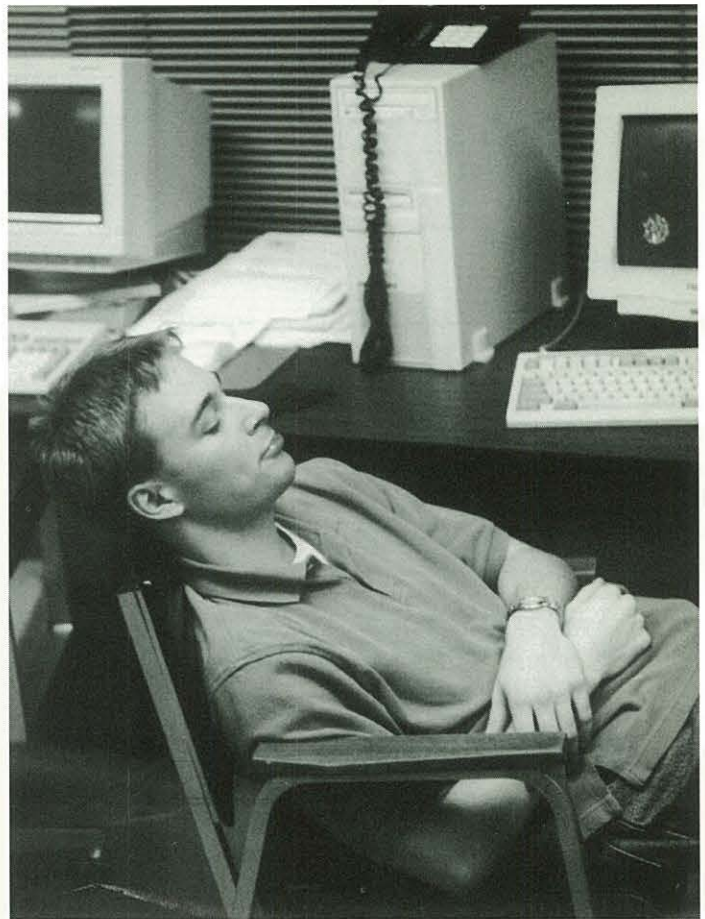

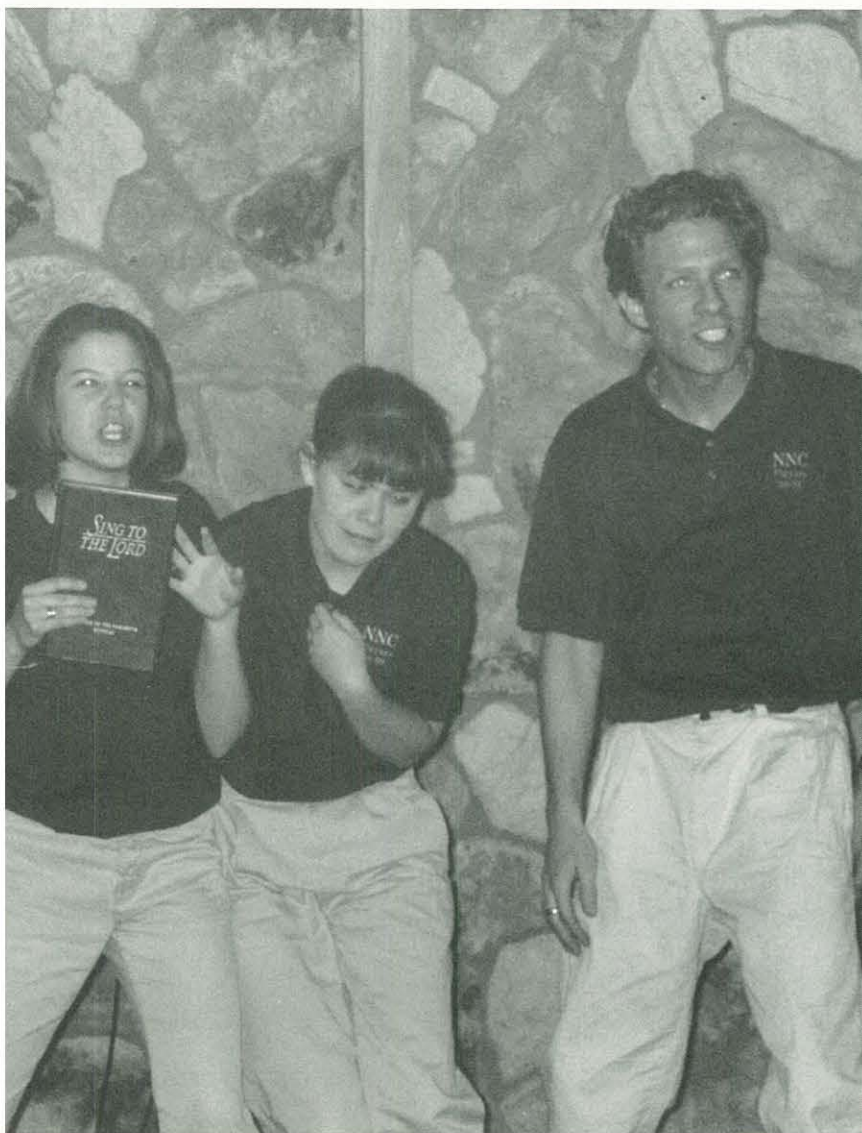

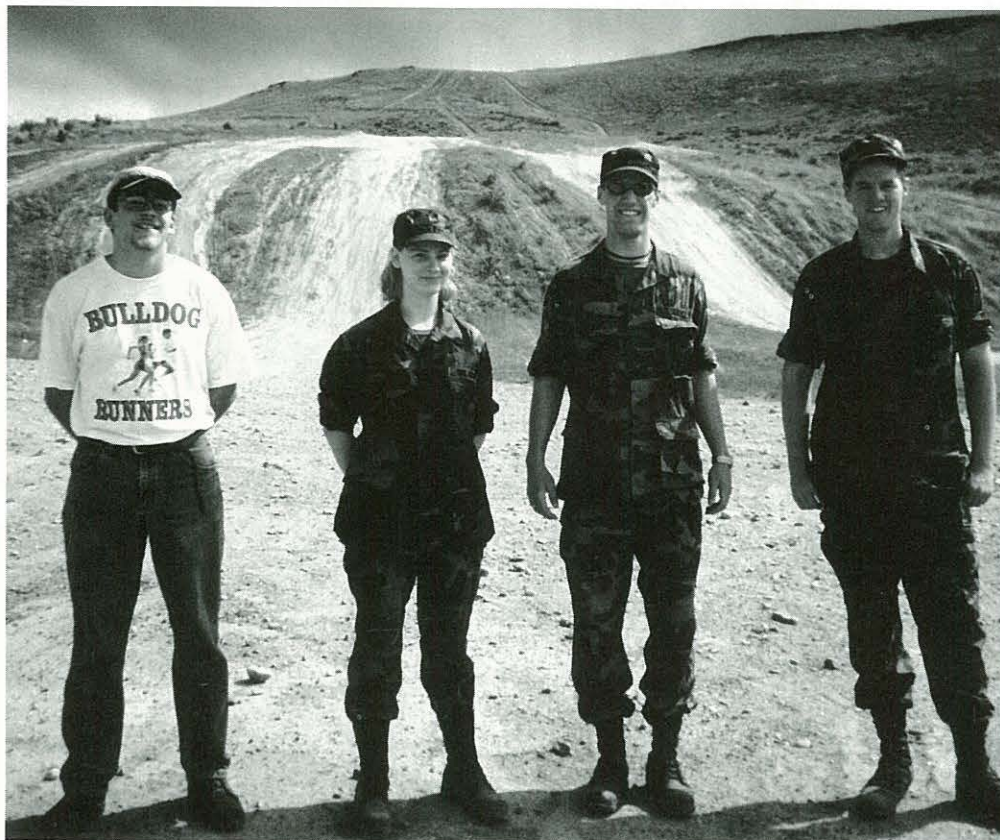

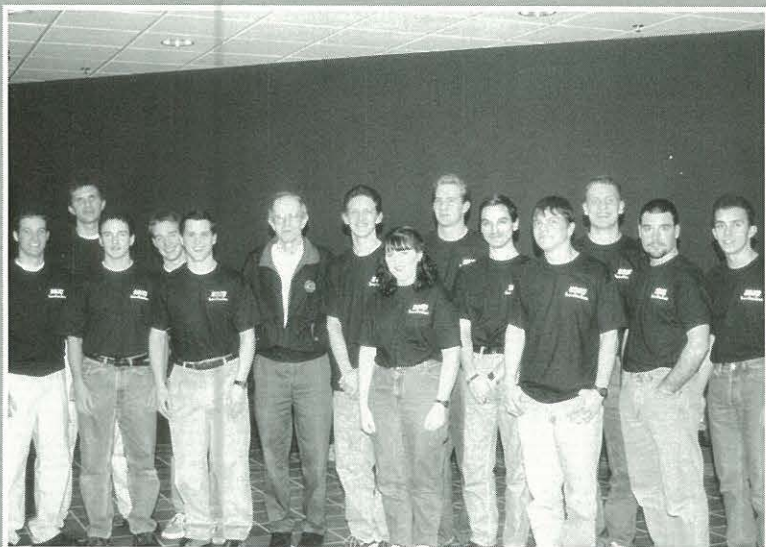
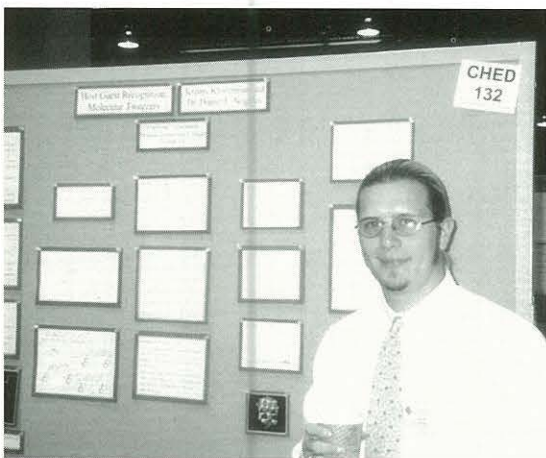

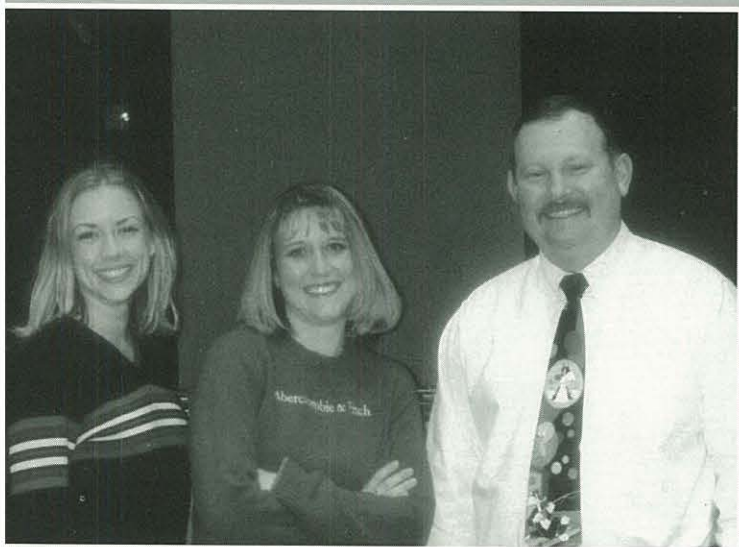

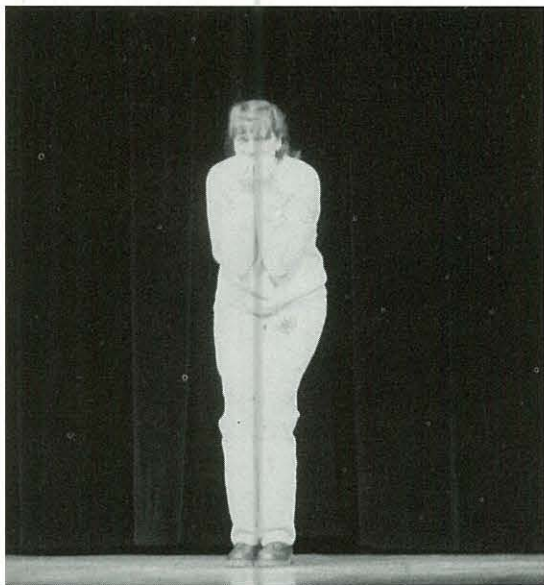

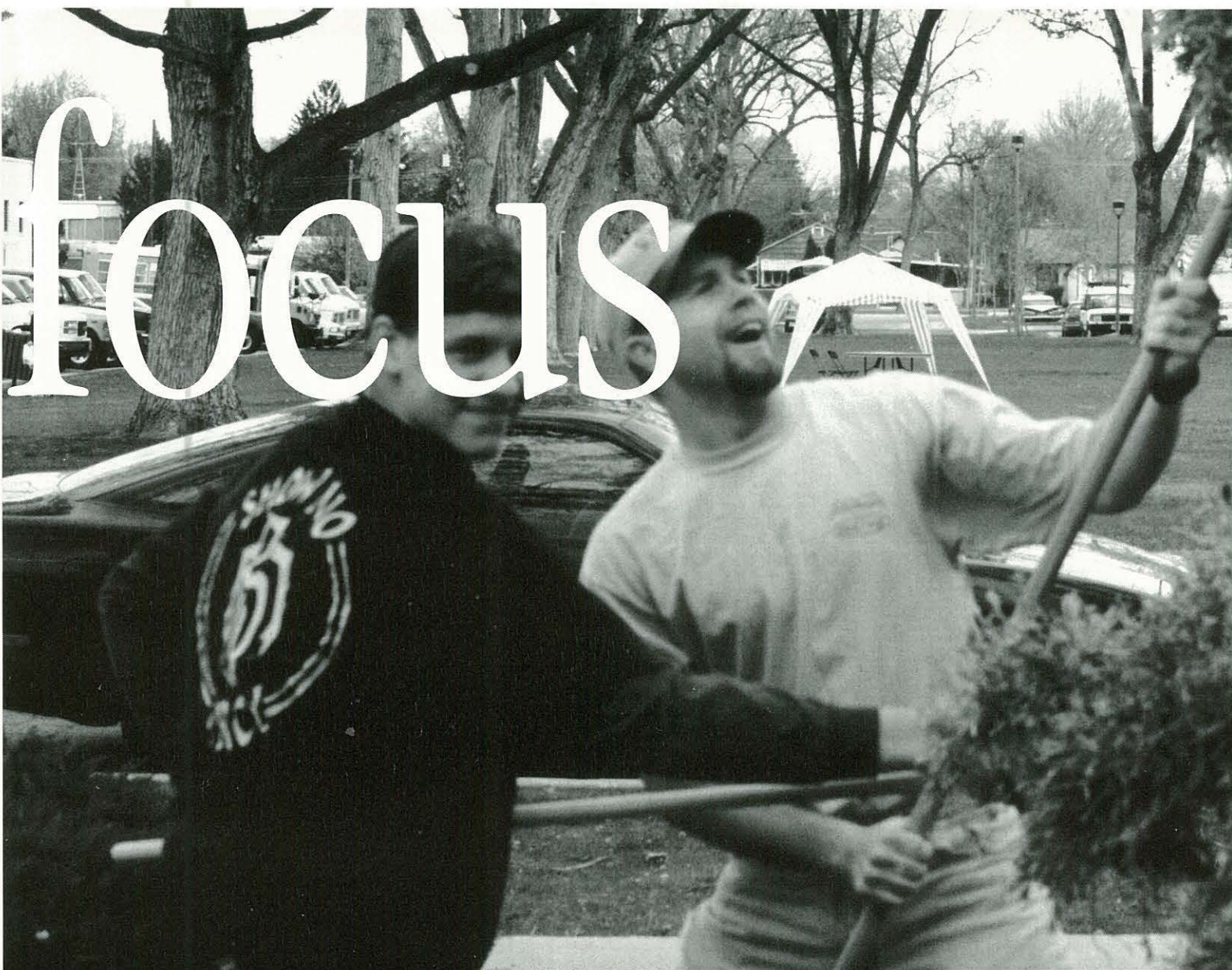

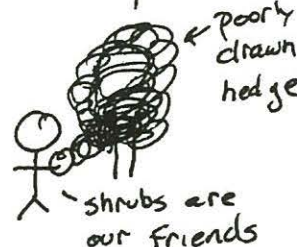

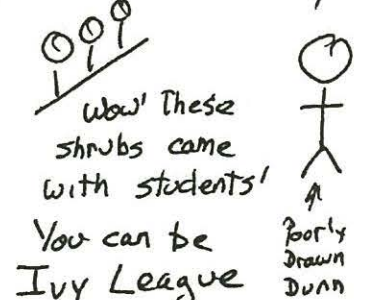
