DIVINE HEALING

"For this purpose was the Son of God manifested to destroy the works of the devil." We take the position that sickness is as much the works of the devil as sin is, for we believe that when God made man He made him a perfect being in body as well as soul. That being true then we can make the claim that sickness is a result of the fall or the work of the devil. Then if that be true and the Son of God was manifested to destroy the works of the devil He was manifested to destroy disease in the individual as He does sin.

In taking up this subject we do not expect to put anything new into it, for it is as old as the Bible and as new as the time in which we live. I am afraid that we as a Holiness Church have become too slack in teaching this great doctrine until we have become the loosers. I want to take the position that had the Church been true to the teaching of the Bible on this there would not have been any of the cults that have sprung up in these days to teach what the Church has failed to do to a great extent, and as a result we have all kinds of healers and many are being lead astray because of it. Since wife and I have been in the work we have seen many kinds of cults and isms started in the name of the Lord and some one would take a bottle of oil and go from house to house healing the sick, and many other kinds which we cannot mention. Some of the rankest kinds of fanaticism and some that have had some good mixed with the other stuff they have peddled. I am not trying to make war on any of these but I have a higher motive than to try to prove that any of them are wrong. The burden of my soul is that we as a Church step up a little higher so that we, can have power with God that the sick can be healed in our own ranks and show to the people we believe what we preach. We say we have faith and believe that God can heal now as well as any time but do we take advantage of our belief and improve our privilege? I am afraid there are too many Nazarenes in the hospitals and being cut to pieces by the surgeons when they might avoid a great deal of it if they would only apply to the Great Physician.

I am not accusing or excusing any one, but I am trying to get it on the minds of the people that they are missing a great privilege which I consider it really is. Not a command but a privilege to be healed. I do not desire to put the healing of the body ahead of the healing of the soul yet I do want us to know that the day of healing is not passed and that it is possible to be

healed now as then I heard an evangelist in the largest church in this city say that those people who are claiming to be healed by the power of God who have not exhausted every means such as the doctor and medicine before going to the Lord, are fit subjects for the asylum. My heart went out in pity for him but much more for his people whom he was filling with such teaching as that. He asked "What are doctors and the drug stores for if not for the people to patronize?" I turn to Exodus 15:26 and read the last clause of the verse, "I am the Lord Who healeth you."

We were glad to meet Brother King and his son Lorraine who was a former student of the college, but our hearts were saddened at the absence of Sister Edith King, whom we have known since we all attended assemblies at Los Angeles before any districts were organized in the church. She served the Lord faithfully and has reached her reward. We were hospitably enterianed in the home of Brother and Sister Honey who did everything possible for our comfort. Mrs. Honey is a sister of Miss Marie Hathaway whom many will remember as a former student of the college. She is married and lives in Tillamook also.

We next visited Alsea, stopping off at McMinnville for a brief visit with Sister DeLance Wallace who was holding special services in the church there.
