### Professor McGraw Resigns Nov. 1st Will Return to Pastorate at Ft. Worth

Prof. McGraw, Religion and Religious Education Major professor, has resigned to return to the pastorate in Fort Worth, Texas, Dr. Corlett informed this paper.

This was to be Prof. McGraw's fourth year at N.N.C., where he has served in the capacity of teacher, major professor, advisor, and his recent position as Assistant to the President.

"We regret very much that Prof. McGraw is leaving us as he is a very fine worker and teacher, but he feels that God will have him return to the pastorate. We wish him God-speed and that he will make a success in that field of work," Dr. Corlett said.

Up to the time the paper went to press no successor had been chosen. Prof. McGraw has made arrangements to begin his pastoral work on November 1st.

When asked for a statement Prof. McGraw said, "I will carry with me many precious memories of life at Northwest Nazarene College, and will always be thankful that it was my privilege to work with Dr. Corlett, one of the greatest men I have ever known, and with the students and

faculty, and many friends we have learned to love; yet I am happy to be entering again the pastoral ministry, feeling it is where God wants me to labor for him. I speak not only for myself, but also for Mrs. McGraw and our sons. Remember us in your prayers, and may God bless each one of you."

On Sunday, October 9, the congregation of College Church will worship for the first time in the newly completed sanctuary. Dr. D. I. Vanderpool, formerly Chairman of the Board of Regents at N. N. C. and now a General Superintendent, will give the message on Opening Sunday. The choir will sing "How Lovely are thy Dwellings," and Prof. J. Raymond Knighton will present in solo "Open the Gates of the Temple."

Dr. Vanderpool will officiate in the dedication of the new church at 3:00 pm October 16. Representatives from the city of Nampa, the Ministerial Association, and the Intermountain District will be present. Many friends of College church will travel great distances to be here for the occasion.

The week linking these two events will be consecrated to the purpose of soul-saving. Dr. Vanderpool will preach evangelistic messages each weekday at 9:30 am and 7:30 pm. In charge of the music is Prof. Knighton.

The exterior of the church having been completed some time ago, shrubbery and lawn are now being planted. Inside, the pews and pulpit furniture, all of Philippine mahogany, are being installed. The worship center of the sanctuary is a gold cross, ten feet in length and with a crossarm measuring six feet, set high above the choir loft on the wall. Behind the cross a panel of dark,

### HOW TO STAY IN COLLEGE

(From NEA Journal, March, 1949)

\* (1) Bring the professor newspaper clippings dealing with his subject.\* Demonstrates fiery interest and gives him timely items to mention to the class. If you can't find clippings dealing with his subject, bring in any clippings at random. He thinks everything deals with his subject.

\* (2) Look alert. Take notes eagerly.\* If you look at your watch, don't stare at it unbelievably and shake it.

\* (3) Nod frequently and murmur, "How true!"\* To you, this seems exaggerated. To him, it's quite objective.

\* (4) Sit in front, near him.\* (Applies only if you intend to stay awake.) If you're going to all the trouble of making a good impression, you might as well let him know who you are, especially in a large class.

\* (5) Laugh at his jokes.\* You CAN tell. If he looks up from his notes and smiles expectantly, he has told a joke.

\* (6) Ask for outside reading.\* You don't have to read it. Just ask.

\* (7) If you must sleep, arrange to be called at the end of the hour.\* It creates an unfavorable impression if the rest of the class has left and you sit there alone, dozing.

\* (8) Be sure the book you read during the lecture looks like a book from the course.\* If you do math in psychology class and psychology in math class, match the books for size and color.

\* (9) Ask any questions you think he can answer.\* Conversely, avoid announcing that you have found the answer to a question he COULDN'T answer, and in your younger brother's second-grade reader at that.

\* (10) Call attention to his writing.\* Produces an exquisitely pleasant experience connected with you. If you know he's written a book on a article, ask in class if he wrote it.

As to whether or not you want to do some work, in addition to all this, well, it's controversial and up to the individual.






