Dr. Lauren Seaman, graduate of N.N.C. in 1931, will present the Mangum Missionary Lectures, February 6-10 inclusive. Dr. Seaman is a medical missionary from Africa who is home on furlough.

After graduating from N.N.C., Dr. Seaman took his graduate medical work at the University of Alberta in Edmonton, Canada.

During his furlough, Dr. Seaman is giving lectures at various places in the states. At present he is at the Nazarene Theological Seminary in Kansas City. While in Africa he was stationed at the Rawleigh Fitkin Memorial Hospital, located in Portugese. Dr. Seaman was at N.N.C. and N.N.A. for several years. While taking his college work he was a member of the A.D.P.'s, Christian Workers Band, a member of the college quartet for three years, president and vice president of Foreign Missions Band and took part in various other campus activities.

Miss Dooley still remembers him as the pupil who took two years of Latin in one summer.

He will speak at College Church Sunday evening, Feb. 5.

## Paul Matthen to be Presented F. 16-17

Paul Matthen, Bass-Baritone and a native of Pawlin, New York will be presented in a concert Thursday, February 16 in the chapel. Mr. Matthen studied vocal training under Frederick Schorr, baritone of the Metropolitan Opera, while carrying graduate courses at Columbia University. In addition to his choir work, Mr. Matthen was soloist at Radio City Music Hall from 1939 to 1941, and was for several years music consultant, conductor and lecturer for the International Business Machines School.

He will be singing various selections by Cavalli, Schutz, Handel, Bach, Brahme, Wolf, Faure, Chanler and Pinkham. He has recorded with Robert Shaw and the Collegiate Chorale the "B Minor Mass," the "Magnificat," and "Cantata No. 140" of Bach for RCA Victor. Other recordings have been made on Hargail Records. He has been heard frequently over national radio chains. For two years Mr. Matthen was a member of the music faculty of Bennington College. He now teaches at the Long School of Music, Cambridge, Mass.

Mr. Matthen and his accompanist Miss Mitrani, will arrive on our campus Thursday and will remain until Friday evening. While here, Mr. Matthen will take part in a chapel service, he will visit the a cappella choir and hold auditions on Friday afternoon. The bass-bariton will be in this section of Idaho for approximately a week. Monday, February 13, he will be singing at the College of Idaho and Wednesday, February 15, he will beat B.J.C.

The S.L.A.'s who would have had a permanent cup if they had won for the third semester consecutively, came in second with 3087 points. The Oly's, with 2836 points, were third and the L.S.P.'s brought up the rear with 2760 points.

The college recently launched a \$50,000 student loan campaign in a service held in College Church the evening of January 22. The male chorus presented a concert and Dr. Corlett presented the need for a student loan fund. He secured pledges amounting to \$3600 from the College Church congregation. During the month of February, Dr. Corlett and Mr. L. Wesley Johnson will contact the churches on the Idaho-Oregon district to obtain pledges for the loan fund.

## Christian Work Not at End in Red China, Says Representative

"Christian work in Red China has not come to an end," Rev. Moe, returned missionary from China assured the students at a recent FMB rally.

Having been in China since 1904 as a missionary, Rev. Moe is well-qualified to speak on the situation there. He represents the National Holiness Mission in Shando province.

He went on to tell those who had gathered to listen to him of some of the atrocities that the Reds perpetrated on the Christian Chinese. One instance was the crucifying of three Chinese pastors on crosses. Because the crosses weren't stood on end the men were able to testify for God the day and a half that they were conscious.

In addition to Rev. Moe the rest of the group traveling for the N.H.M. spoke and showed pictures. Miss Morgan presented slides on their South India Bible Institute. Also pictures of Honduras were shown with shots of their airplane and "Sky Pilot."

Mr. E. J. Harper, Sunday school superintendent, says that "Our motto for this year is 'Let's Get a Head Start on Olivet.'" Mr. Fel-tar, supervisor of the college department, when asked his reaction said, "We made it two out of three, and with the cooperation of everyone in the college department, we'll make it three out of four."

Our pastor, "When the Riley and Kelly Irish ire gets aroused—watch out Olivet." They all say that they want YOU, one and all, old and new, to attend College Church Sunday school this Sunday and every Sunday. Departmental quotas are: Nursery, 15; Beginner-Primary, 95; Junior, 45; Intermediates, 35; High School, 80; College, 225; and Adult, 325.

Highest attendance last year was 1,047, which broke all previous existing records. Average attendance during the contest was 819.

Eastern Oregon College of Education invades the local hardwood tonight for the first of a two game series with the Crusaders. The Mountaineers split in a pair of tilts at LaGrande last week and for both quintets this week-end's series will be the chance to take three victories over the other.

At LaGrande the Crusaders chalked up a 73-61 triumph in the first tussle only to succumb before the Oregonians 61-48 in the second tilt. Little Bobby Green, a speedy guard, led the Mountaineer attack in those two tilts with 16 and 12 points. Merriman with 14 and 10 points in the two games trailed him in the scoring column.

For the Crusaders Cramer with 15 and 12 tallies and Iles with 14 and 8 markers were the top point getters. The orange and black cagers lost the second game in the opening minutes when they could connect on only 4 of 27 shot attempts while Eastern Oregon was hitting from all angles to build up an insurmountable lead.




