#### **Students Who Plan To Take Selective** Service Exam In April Must File Now

All eligible students who intend to take the Selective Service College Qualification Test in 1952 For Society Plays should file applications at once for the April 24 administration, Selective Service National Headquarters advised today.

An application and a bulletin of The combined LSP-Oly societies formation may be obtained at any have chosen the comedy, "The Perinformation may be obtained at any Selective Service local board. Following instructions in the bulletin, the student should fill out his application immediately and mail it in the special envelope provided. Applications must be postmarked no later than midnight, March 10, 1952. Early filing will be greatly to the student's advantage.

**Draft Board Sees Results** Results will be reported to the student's Selective Service local board of jurisdiction for use in considering his deferment as a student, according to Educational Testing Service, which prepares and administers the College Qualification Test.

To be eligible to take this test, a student must intend to request deferment as a student. Second, he must be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time college course, and third, he must not have previously taken a Selective Service college qualification test.

Score of 70 Needed

Information released by Selective Service headquarters indicates that criteria for deferment as a student are either a satisfactory score of 70 or better on the test or satisfac- Sixty Gain High tory rank in class. To qualify in class rank a student must be in the upper half of the freshman class, the upper two-thirds of the sophomore class and upper three-fourths of the junior class.

Seniors accepted for admission to a graduate school satisfy the requirements if they stand in the upper half of their class or make a score of 75 or better on the test.

Radio station KROK, "The Voice of the Campus," is now being operated by the associated student body of N. N. C. The present broadcast schedule includes the chapel broadcast each weekday morning and evening broadcasts Monday through Friday from 7 to 9 o'clock.

Sunday evening church services from College Church will mark the beginning of each broadcast week. Station Manager Melvin Laws, with the help of the student council, chose his associates last week. Paul Wright was elected to fill the spot of assistant manager, with Cecil Thompson as his High School assistant-

Business Manager Ross Carrol and his assistant, Richard Grenier, were also recently elected. Chief announcer is Ronald Kirkpatrick who will probably choose John Stockett as his High School assistant. Chief engineer's spot will continue to be filled by Edward Manley, president of the College High radio club.

Manager Melvin Laws invites anyone who is really interested and willing to work to contact him or any of these officers for positions on the KROK staff. He further advocates that experience is not essential if the student is willing to learn and reminds the students that they will receive points toward an activity letter for their work on the radio force.

Spot ads are sold at the rate of 50c a spot which is about 25 percent cheaper than regular broadcast rates. These enable the station to be self-supporting but discs for their record library are largely obtained through donations, states Paul Wright. Anyone having re-cords which they would like to see put to use on the KROK turntable may get in touch with any staff officer or take them directly to the studio in the High School building. All members of the student body

and faculty are invited to visit the studio any evening during broadcast time. If groups of more than four wish to look over the station layout, Laws asks that they check with him a day or so in advance.
