In 1942 the art department at NNC was founded. At that time it was a school within a school as it was owned by its organizer, Prof. A. J. Finkbeiner who pioneered this, the first art department in the Nazarene movement. NNC was the first of the church colleges to offer an art major. Now after these 12 years, Prof. Finkbeiner has resigned.

Mr. Finkbeiner who had built it up. To encourage students in the field of art, he granted scholarships, and is still granting them, on his own. Many have been helped because of it.

Policy Gains Recognition

One practice which Prof. Finkbeiner began was that of each year presenting to the school a picture made by graduating art majors. This was started in 1944 with a future Art Gallery in mind. To date over 50 pictures have been given, valued at several thousands of dollars.

Because of the policy, NNC will gain national recognition. A letter asking in specific detail concerning the presentation of these pictures was recently received by the art department from a big Missouri University. They are compiling a book and are giving NNC a complete section explaining this policy.

Graduating from Linfield College in 1939 with a B. F. A., Prof. Finkbeiner became identified with NNC in 1942. During his stay here he has served on several faculty committees, and has sponsored all of the societies at various times. It may be interesting to note that eleven societies that he sponsored have taken the faculty loving cup.

Author of Texts

While Prof. has been on our faculty, he has written five art textbooks, one of which has been adopted by different colleges and universities. In 1947 he presented a national art exhibit at Sun Valley on invitation by the National Business and Professional Women's organization which met there.

During the month of August, Prof. will attend graduate school in Indianapolis, Ind. He will then return to Nampa to run his business. This fall he plans to have an art service, having a class for rural art teachers.

Aside from these duties he has decided to enter the Idaho senatorial race. I know that we all wish him God's richest blessing.
