The Spiritual Life of Dr. Strickland

Dr. Charles Strickland, General Superintendent in the Church of the Nazarene has been speaking NNC classes, holding services at Nampa First Church and lecturing to the student body in chapel since Wednesday as NNC's "distinguished Christian scholar" for this year. The Thomas F. Staley Foundation of New York granted NNC money to sponsor "Spiritual Life Week every year, in order to help strengthen small college campuses by bringing them distinguished Christian scholars who believe and communicate the gospel of Jesus Christ to students. Dr. Strickland, holding one of the six highest offices in the Church of the Nazarene since 1972, along with being a District Superintendent of the Europeans in South Africa from 1948-1966, among other things, is a good representative of such caliber to our college.

These were 1(a genuine emotional need for confidence, which if not met, causes a child to make attempts to gain 2(power and control. When the child is not allowed to achieve these, he feels 3(anger, causing him to take revenge A child also needs 4(love. When he feels he is not getting enough love he will try anything to get 5(attention. A child wants a 6(strong sense of worth also; so much in fact, that he will madly seek 7 (perfection. When none of the child's needs are met either positively or negatively, he will 8(search for psychological safety on his own, sometimes going so far as to completely withdraw.

Narramore offered much advice on building a child's self-concept and noted several techiniques to use in dealing with misbehavior such as natural and logical consequences, rewarding and extinction and even spanking. (However, the last is to only be used when nothing else will work.) He pointed out that the techniques should only be used to discipline, not to punish.




citizen efforts, which have been aided by the Western Bloc, a coalition of citizen organizations concerned about nuclear power development. The Bloc was a product of Ralph Nader's 'Critical Mass" convention in 1974 and the People's Lobby, a Los Angeles-based organization. Both have spearheaded petition drives to put initiatives on the ballot and have been supported by a number of conservation organizations, including Friends of the Earth and Sierra Club.

The nuclear power industry fears that the safeguard rules called for in the initiatives could ban nuclear power plants outright. E.L. Prince, a nuclear expert with Pacific Power and Light Company, believes that the industry cannot meet the regulations proposed in the Oregon initiative. He feels that present review agencies are doing an adequate job. The Atomic Industrial Forum (AIF), the nuclear power industry's trade association, also opposes the initiative, calling it unworkable in concept and invalid as law.

The AIF contends that when Congress enacted the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, it established a national policy to develop nuclear energy and assigned the responsibility for regulating the development to the federal government. Consequently, AIF believes that the states do not have the legal right to subvert this national plan by banning nuclear reactors. The Forum also argues that banning reactors would put a strain on Pacific Coast states' ability to produce the power they need.

Organizations such as the Western Bloc have supported the nuclear initiatives because of the growing questions about plant safety, the skyrocketing costs of nuclear power, the need for energy conservation, and the potential for the development of safer, alternative energy sources. An unreleased study by the Federal Energy Administration (FEA), leaked to syndicated newspaper columnist Jack Anderson last December, indicates that a moratorium and phase out of existing power plants in California a n d e v e n throughout the nation would be feasible if accompanied by a substantial increase in national coal consumption. The study, "energy Picture: California and the Western Region," was compiled in preparation for FEA testimony before a committee of the California state legisla-

tion but was not released
